It makes our clubs more relevant and our voices more powerful if people know how much work we actually do. It also encourages people to join as they want to be a part of a group that is active!

Book recommendation from Literacy Chair Paula Carver:

Abraham Lincoln said "We are not enemies, but friends."

Do you wish our country could be more united? Are you tired of the divisiveness coming from both sides of the aisle, conservatives vs. liberals? Is it even possible to entirely come together? Statistically one in six persons now has a friend or relative he avoids or no longer speaks to because of his disdain for the other person's stance.

Arthur Brooks states that our country has never been totally together, even in times of war; however, in his book LOVE YOUR ENEMIES** he offers a pathway to overcome (even if partially) the contemptuous culture in which we live. He states that in the U.S., businesses exist that prosper by setting Americans against Americans. ("No kidding!" you might add.)

Brooks' ideas are backed up with behavioral research and his years of experience as head of a policy think tank. The book's purpose is "a roadmap to arrive at the happiness that comes when we choose to love one another, despite our differences" according to the author.

In the initial chapters he presents five rules for the reader:

- 1-Try to listen empathetically and respectfully to those who disagree with you. Why would you expect them to listen to you if you won't listen to them?
- 2-Use the 5 to 1 rule offer five positive things to every one negative statement you may hear or see (particularly on social media)
- 3-Treat others with kindness and respect, even when it's difficult. Remember that contempt never works to convince someone to change his mind.
- 4-Go where you're not invited and say things people don't expect. Seek out those who disagree with you and learn from them.

5-Follow the above rules.

The remainder of the book guides the reader through steps to follow these rules. His suggestions are amazing and easy.

And finally SMILE: "The smile is a powerful weapon for leaders who seek to spread positivity and unify others."

Straw Poll" at their last meeting






where members voted on their preference for presidential nominee and for issues that concern them the most. This is a great way to keep people engaged.
